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What's Black History Month about?

October marks the start of Black History Month (BHM) UK – a time to celebrate and remember African and Caribbean heritage peoples' achievements and contributions to the British economy, culture, and history. It's a chance to tell the stories of those less well-known Black Britons who we will forget if we don't showcase them.

WHAT IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH UK?

Black History Month UK began in October 1987 by Akyaaba Sebo, a special projects coordinator of the Ethnic Minorities Unit at the now defunct Great London Council. He wanted to boost the self-esteem of Black British children and young adults by educating them on the long history and achievements of Black people living in the UK.

Taking inspiration from Black History Month (also known as African American History Month) in the United States. The first event was held on 1 October 1987 at County Hall and was attended by American historian Dr. Maulana Karenga, who founded the African American holiday of Kwanzaa; and Kenyan women's activist Wanjiru Kihoro.

It has since evolved into a **national movement recognised by the British government and observed throughout the UK.** It is also recognised in other parts of the world during October in Ireland and the Netherlands. In the US, where Black History Month originated, the awareness month is held in February. It is also celebrated in Canada in February too when it was officially recognised in 1995. **Since the 1990s, the significance of Black History Month** has gradually increased throughout continental Europe and it is now observed in Germany, Belgium, and Italy in February.

WHAT ARE THE ORIGINS OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH?

In 1926, African-American historian Carter G Woodson started national Negro History Week to advocate for the inclusion of American Black History in the US national public education system. Over time, and with the momentum and support of the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s. In week gradually morphed into the month it is today. In 1976, US Black History Month (or African American Month as it's now regularly referred to) was officially recognised by President Gerald Ford.

WHY IS IT CELEBRATED AT DIFFERENT TIMES ACROSS THE GLOBE?



After visiting America in the 1970s, **Addai-Sebo created a British version of Black History Month in 1987**, but they are not officially linked. In the United States, Black History Month takes place in February to coincide with the births of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. Addai-Sebo chose to celebrate Black History Month UK in October because of the month's importance in the African calendar. More importantly, it was the start of the British academic year.

WHY SHOULD WE SEPARATE BLACK HISTORY MONTH CELEBRATIONS IN THE US AND UK?

When Black History Month UK started in the UK, there was a big emphasis on African American history. Over time the focus has moved to celebrating and recognising Black British history and key Black figures in the UK.

It's important also that we focus only on British Black history as the Black British community is a composite of peoples with different cultures and identities. Some individuals with a lineage beginning long before the **Windrush generation** and others with distinct and very different cultures rooted in the African and Caribbean continents.

WHY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH UK 2025 NEEDED?

Following the anti-black racism protests that swept the globe in 2020, there was a step-change in how racism was addressed by individuals and organisations. honest dialogues were opened, however, contentious, over Britain's colonial past, and diversity and inclusion became a key component of corporate policy,however per formative the action.

Change is happening but there is still a long way to go as stories enter the mainstream and UK Black history, is rightly seen as just British history. It must be ensure that the stories of lesser-known Black Britons are not forgotten and that the authenticity of those stories is not lost, and are told their own words.

"[UK] Black history is a series of missing chapters from British history", **said David Olusoga**, historian, and we must be involved in the telling of these stories. Black History Month exists to tell these stories in our own voices. It's our chance to shine a light on individuals who aren't featured in the mainstream and whose contributions would be forgotten without Black History Month UK.

But Black History Month UK, like many other national and international events, provides us with an opportunity to remember individuals and events that would never be included in a racially inclusive national curriculum and would remain forgotten to the annals of time.

WHAT ARE THE AIMS OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH IN THE UK?

To celebrate and recognise the achievements of African and Caribbean heritage people's role in helping to shape UK culture, history, and economic development. Educating the UK population on how the relationships between Britain, Africa, the Caribbean and the United States helped create modern Britain. To encourage government, institutions, and corporations to embrace and adopt equality and diversity oligins.



In the 1980s, Ethiopia was devastated by famine. Musicians led global fundraising activities, such as Band Aid and Live Aid. to raise money for famine relief.

Hackney reggae artists Leon Leiffer and GeneRondo came together in January 1985 to form The British Reggae Artists Famine Appeal Team BRAFA) with fellow musicians including Courtney Carr, Raymond Dangarembizi, Ras Elroy Bailey, Jah Bunny, Tony Douglas, Ken Kendricks and Fay.

On 24 February 1985 over 200 singers, musicians, local residents, and school children joined the BRAFA team at Hive Studio in Stoke Newington to record the charity song Let's Make Africa Green Again. The recording session featured many leading reggae artists including Aswad, Dennis Brown, Janet Kay and Trevor Walters.

The song was released by Island Records in April 1985.



Released by Island Records in April 1985, all profits from the record went to the charity Save the Children Fund for long-term development projects in famine-affected areas of Africa.

BRAFA's hugely successful benefit concert was held in Shoreditch Park on Bank Holiday Monday, 26 May 1986. Over 10,000 people watched top reggae and soul performers, including many of those featured on the BRAFA charity record.

BRAFA raised thousands of pounds for Save the Children Fund's Ethiopian famine appeal.

LOST PILOTS OF THE CARIBBEAN PRINCE ALBERT JACOB (JAKE)

The 100th birthday of a World War Two RAF veteran will be celebrated at an event organised by the Royal British Legion. Prince Albert Jacob, known as Jake, will mark his "incredible milestone" with family and friends at the Black Country Living Museum in Dudley on Friday.

The former Great Britain athlete was 17 when he joined the forces in 1943, but like many Black servicemen, he would have to wait decades for official recognition, said the RBL, only gaining the medals he was entitled to in 2023. Garry Stewart, RBL's community engagement officer, said it was important to "come together as a community to celebrate and pay thanks to Prince Albert Jacob on his momentous 100th birthday".



"Victory would not have been achieved without the courage and fortitude of our greatest generation, to whom we owe our freedom and way of life," he added. After signing up for the RAF, the teenager from Trinidad travelled to America for specialist training before arriving in Britain to begin military service during the height of the war. As part of the ground crew, Jake played a vital role in keeping aircraft airworthy and ensuring the flow of supplies. When the war ended, Jake returned to Trinidad hoping his RAF skills would help him find work at the airport but was rejected. He returned to Britain in 1947, a year before the arrival of the Empire Windrush.

He met his wife Mary, and the couple married in 1953 despite fierce disapproval from her family, who refused to attend the wedding. Their early years were marked by hostility, facing racist abuse. He has previously described being treated as a "nonentity". After the war, Mr Jacob became a post office manager and settled with his wife in Knowle, Solihull. He also achieved success as an athlete, representing Great Britain as a runner in the 1950s.

Artlink Hull invites you to The Nearness of Elsewhere, a new commission of paintings and digital projections by London-based artist Emma Prempeh. Reflecting on her London upbringing and her African-Caribbean heritage, Emma Prempeh consistently returns to the theme of home. Utilising magic realism, she re-examines diasporic identity through storytelling and myth, commenting on the circularity of time and memory. Her work assesses her personal relationship with place and highlights the stories of others who share similar experiences.

Curated in collaboration with Tiwani Contemporary, this exhibition is inspired by research visits to Hull, where Emma has led workshops and attended community gatherings to incorporate the stories of local people and places. This summer, Prempeh invited people in Hull to contribute creatively to the canvases, encouraging reflection on interiors and natural environments that hold personal significance. Flowers from local greenspaces are merged with blooms from Prempeh's native South London. Interiors featuring bay windows, such as those commonly seen in terrace houses around Hull, collide with views of the Humber Bridge as seen from the Humber Bridge Country Park, a marker of returning home for many who live here.



VENTURE SMITH - THE STORY

Venture was actually born to a West African Ruler, not that that counted for much when he was captured and marched 1000 miles - longer than walking from Land's End to John O'Groats - to be sold for "four gallons of rum and piece of calico" to a man called Robinson Mumford. It was here he was given his new name; Venture, based on the idea that he was a business venture.

'My freedom is a privilege nothing can equal'

His gravestone reads...

'Sacred to the Memory of Venture Smith an African tho son of a King he was kidnapped and sold as a slave but by his industry he acquired Money to purchase his Freedom who died Sept 19th 1805 in ye 77th Year of his Age. '




Well Venture grew up and he was big - well over 6ft - and the older he got, the harder he was worked and the more severe his punishments became. But there was love, in the shape of Marget (Dutch origin) - Meg - who was also enslaved. They married and had their daughter Hannah, but Venture was then sold to the Stanton family, separating the family. He managed to convince them to buy Meg so they could be together, but their lives there were horrific - Venture stood in the middle of a fight between Mr Stanton and his wife, ending in violence and the theft of all the money he'd been saving to buy the freedom of his family.

He was then bought and sold once more before being purchased by Capt. Oliver Smith, and they struck a deal together - Venture could buy his freedom, paying over time. He and Meg had more children - Solomon and Cuff - before he was able to give Smith the 71 pounds and two shillings he'd earnt to walk away a free man, taking Smith's surname in honour of the one man who'd kept his word. The Stanton family still had Meg, Hannah Solomon and Cuff, and a member of Mumford family had Hannah, so Venture spent his first years as a free man living and working on Long Island to earn enough to buy his whole family's freedom.

Over seven years he purchased his children for 200 dollars each and his pregnant wife for 40 dollars, investing in land and property in Connecticut once they were all free. And his investment grew and grew and grew, from 10 to over 130 acres, allowing him to spend time farming his land, lumbering, fishing, whaling and trading, which is how and where he spent the remainder of his life. Venture Smith died on Sept 19, 1805. He's buried alongside his beloved Meg, who died in 1809, and his son Solomon.

"Together We Can" is more than a tagline—it's a promise to create safe spaces, drive meaningful change, and build a university where every student feels seen, heard, and valued.



A design entrepreneur is spearheading plans to stage an annual Hull Fashion Week.

Seguntuyi Onakoya, the founder and creative director of fashion brand HOUSEOFTUYI – which blends cultural storytelling with contemporary design – has outlined his vision for the event.

Since moving to the UK from Nigeria in 2022 to complete a master's degree in advertising and marketing at the <u>University of Hull</u>, Seguntuyi has embedded himself in the region's creative scene. Mrs Allen joined the Met Police in 1968 at the age of 29 after working as a nurse in Croydon, south London.

She served in the Met for four years, first in Croydon then at the Missing Persons Bureau, before moving to Jamaica where she continued to work as a police officer.

In a statement the Met Police said: "We are grateful for your service Sislin, you paved the way for so many others."

Mrs Allen was working as a nurse at Croydon's Queens Hospital when she decided to make a career change after seeing a recruitment advert for male and female officers.

She trained at Peel House and her first posting was at Fell Road police station in Croydon, near her family and where she lived.

In 2020 she received a lifetime achievement award from the National Black Police Association (NBPA).

Actor Nichelle Nichols, who found worldwide fame and led the way for black women in TV by starring in the original Star Trek TV series, Nichols, who was best known for her role on the show in the 1960s as Lieutenant Nyota Uhura and helped shatter racial stereotypes at the height of the Civil Rights movement, died in July aged 89. Her role in the 1966-69 series as Lieutenant Nyota Uhura earned Nichols great respect from the show's hardcore fans, known as Trekkers and Trekkies. It also earned her accolades for breaking racial stereotypes and included an interracial on screen kiss with co-star William Shatner that was unheard of at the time.

NASA recruiter

Like other original cast members, Nichols also appeared in six big-screen spinoffs starting in 1979 with Star Trek: The Motion Picture and frequented Star Trek fan conventions.

She also served for many years as a NASA recruiter, helping bring minorities and women into the astronaut corps.

The original Star Trek's overriding message to viewers was that in the far-off future – the 23rd century – human diversity would be fully accepted.





"I think many people took it into their hearts... that what was being said on TV at that time was a reason to celebrate," Nichols said in 1992.

She often recalled how Martin Luther King Jr was a fan of the show and praised her role. She met him at a civil rights gathering in 1967, at a time when she had decided not to return for the show's second season.

"When I told him I was going to miss my co-stars, and I was leaving the show, he became very serious and said, 'You cannot do that,'" she told a newspaper in 2008.

"You've changed the face of television forever, and therefore, you've changed the minds of people," she said the civil rights leader told her.

"That foresight Dr King had was a lightning bolt in my life," Nichols said.

Now, she has been added to a memorial flight in a rocket ship due to carry cremated ashes and DNA samples from departed space enthusiasts on a final and eternal voyage around the sun, according to organisers of the tribute.

Curl types are a good blueprint for figuring out the type of hair you have. It is best identified when the hair is wet, and the texture is more evident. It can often help to decide what products will work best for the type of hair. However, the hair types, put into 4 categories, are not prescriptive and people often have hair that fits into multiple categories. Kinky hair (4a-c) is the hair type most afro hair is. This hair has tight coils but is also very prone to damage.

HAIR TYPES

Hair styling can also be affected by how porous your hair is. This affects the ability of the hair to stay hydrated. It can mean the difference between how well the hair absorbs oils and moisture from products. Black hair types often have low porosity. The way to test the porosity of your hair is to put a clean strand of hair into a glass of water, if it floats to the top before sinking, that is a signifier of low porosity. People with low porosity hair can use protein-free conditioners and 100% shea butter as a way to seal in moisture.



With the support of Neighbourly, our work with older adults is producing better outcomes through our capacity to collect and distribute surplus food to those who are housebound and other vulnerable groups in the community. Women-Accede has gained reputation as 'A Friend of Older People' because we are now in a position to reach more people due to an increase in the number of our volunteers and our weekly Drop in sessions. We are interested in food growing and allotment work and would require support in this area. As a community and voluntary group, all of our activities are currently charitable and there are no costs attached to our service users.

She was the first black artist to have a number-one hit in the <u>UK Singles Chart</u> and had the first piano instrumental to reach number one in the UK Singles Chart, with "<u>Let's Have Another Party</u>" in 1954, and as of 2023, remains the only female instrumentalist to do so.

Cecile continues to campaign for humanity and human rights, during Black History Month and throughout the year with Hull Amnesty Group.
